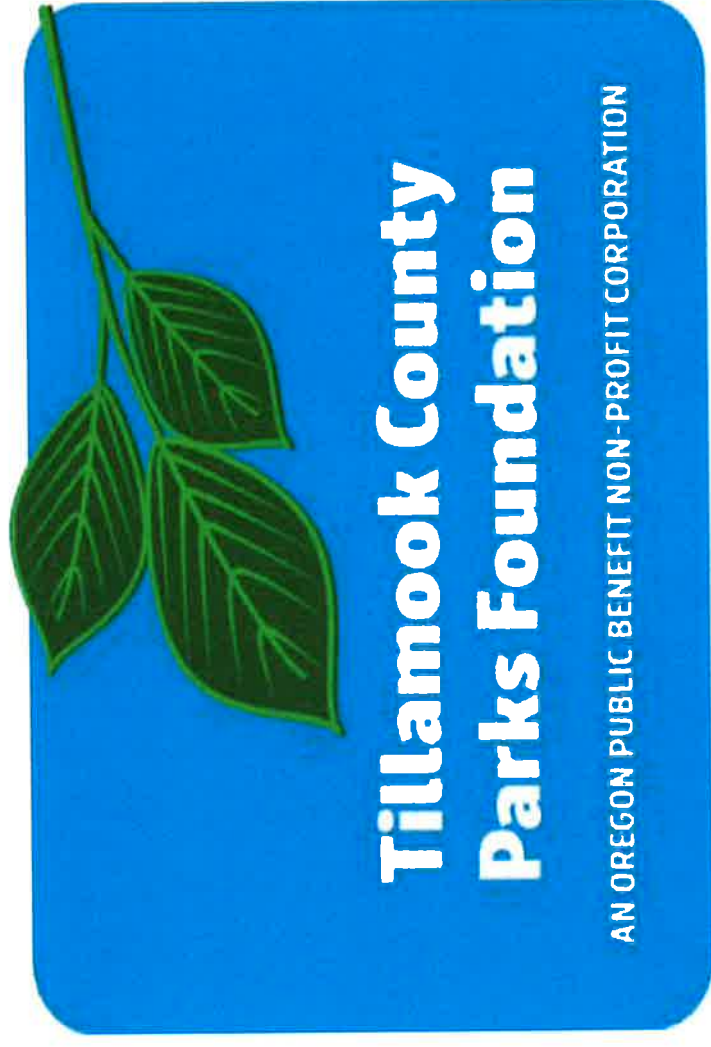

We, the Tillamook County Board of Commissioners, are writing this letter to express our support and commitment to Oregon's application for the EPA's Climate Pollution Reduction Implementation Grants. Tillamook County greatly appreciates the State of Oregon and the Department of Environmental Quality's swift and strong action on both climate and the ongoing housing crisis. We believe that this application aligns with the goals and priorities of the EPA's Pollution Reduction Grant Program.

Oregon DEQ has a proven track record of implementing measures to reduce greenhouse gas emissions through Built Environment programs such as small housing, deconstruction, and low-carbon concrete. Your dedication to engaging and prioritizing environmental justice communities through these opportunities has had a positive and lasting impact on Oregon's communities. Tillamook County is excited to partner with Oregon DEQ and has both the existing capacity and great need to participate in implementing the measures to reduce the carbon footprint of residential construction through the development of space-efficient housing.

Tillamook County is equipped and ready to support the implementation of the Climate Pollution Reduction program in the following ways:

- Through the Tillamook County Housing Commission and the Tillamook County Multi-Family Rental Housing Fund, Tillamook has an existing pipeline for identifying and supporting space efficient housing production opportunities through grant funding.
- The Housing Commission has an established competitive grant application program that has been proven successful in supporting the production of affordable and workforce level housing and is able to implement the requirements of the EPA grant program.
- The Housing Commission has a network of partners and a pipeline for identifying space efficient housing units awaiting funding solutions that would qualify for participation in this program and will be able to efficiently distribute funds to qualified projects.
- Tillamook County has over 130 space efficient affordable and workforce housing units in pre-development that will qualify and make immediate use of this grant.

- The Tillamook County Housing Commission and the Multi-Family Rental Housing Fund has provided \$1.2 million in support of affordable and workforce housing and will continue to have the ability to provide \$400,000+ of support for affordable and workforce housing production annually.
- The Tillamook County Housing Coordinator is a dedicated housing production position able to work with grant recipients to connect them to additional funding opportunities to ensure that projects are fully supported to completion.
- The Department of Community Development has a proven track record of supporting housing innovation, including supporting space efficient housing construction.
- The Housing Commission has regional partners able to support the financial administration, accounting, and reporting of grant programs of this size.

Tillamook County is excited about the opportunity to grow our partnership through the Climate Pollution Reduction Implementation Grant. The need for this work is critical to meet Oregon's goals in reducing climate pollution while also addressing urgent housing needs and we are confident that our work together through this grant can be used as a model throughout Oregon and for other states looking to implement similar programs. We look forward to working collaboratively to address complex climate issues to benefit those most impacted by climate change and the housing crisis.

EPA Climate Pollution Reduction Grant: Space-Efficient, Affordable and Workforce Housing

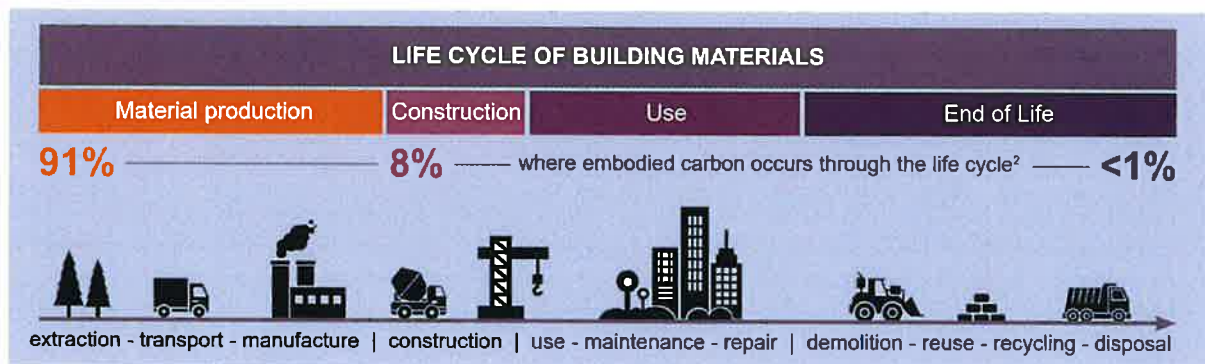
Background of EPA grant

The [Climate Pollution Reduction Grant \(CPRG\) Program](#) is one of many federal funding opportunities created through the [Inflation Reduction Act](#) and administered by the U.S. [Environmental Protection Agency](#). This grant program has a two-step process—planning then implementation. The State of Oregon has developed a Priority Climate Action Plan (PCAP), due to EPA March 1, 2024, to highlight meaningful opportunities to reduce climate pollution. The State of Oregon is also seeking Climate Pollution Reduction Grants (CPRG) to support the implementation of strategies outlined in the PCAP. The CPRG application is due to EPA by April 1, 2024.

Oregon's PCAP focuses on strategies to reduce emissions from transportation, residential and commercial buildings, as well as waste and materials. Space-efficient housing is one of the twelve strategies proposed within Oregon's CPRG application.

What is the strategy and why was it selected

Building materials account for 8 percent of [Oregon's consumption-based greenhouse gas emissions](#). These emissions are associated with the extraction, manufacturing, transport, construction, and disposal of these materials, and are often referred to as "embodied carbon".



House size is among the most important determinants of the environmental impact of housing. A [DEQ report](#) found the operational and embodied carbon impacts of extra-small homes (1149 square feet in the study) are reduced 20 to 40 percent compared to medium sized homes. Smaller, space-efficient homes can include Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs), duplexes, triplexes, quadplexes, cottage cluster, townhouses, and multifamily.

If awarded, CPRG funds would incentivize construction of space-efficient affordable or workforce housing. The projects funded through this program will serve as demonstration projects. Outcomes from the demonstration projects will inform future projects and help guide state and local policy that could continue to support space-efficient housing.

Implementation

To implement this measure, DEQ would serve as a pass-through entity, distributing funds to local governments for implementation. The local governments would run a competitive grant process to distribute the funds to support space-efficient housing development in their communities. DEQ has established a per unit fixed incentive of up to \$20,000. In addition, DEQ anticipates up to 5 percent of grant funding will be utilized to support administration of the award by local governments.

Projects would need to meet the following requirements to be eligible for funding:

- Build space-efficient housing, defined as an average of 800 square feet per unit, with some variation based on number of bedrooms
- At least 25 percent of new housing units must be < 80% AMI, all others must < 120% AMI
- Maintain affordability of units for a minimum of 5-years
- Reduce total embodied carbon of new materials used by 10 percent
- Davis-Bacon Act prevailing wage
- Complete construction of units within the implementation period (see estimated timeline below)

Estimated 5-year timeline (firm deadlines underlined):

- March 14, 2024 – letter of support from local governments due to DEQ to be included in CPRG application
- April 1, 2024 – DEQ submits Climate Pollution Reduction Grant application to EPA
- July 2024 – Anticipated EPA issues notification of funding selection
- October 2024 – Anticipated award and beginning of implementation period (if awarded)
- October 2024 – June 2025 – local governments run competitive grant process
- June - October 2025 – local governments award grants and execute contracts
- October 2025 - April 2029 – implementation
- May - October 2029 – Close out, end of CPRG implementation period

Roles and responsibilities of DEQ

- Pass-through entity distributing funds to local governments
- Oversight of implementation of strategy across all jurisdictions, ensuring compliance with Federal requirements, including reporting to EPA
- Development of key requirements, review of RFP materials and eligibility of received proposals
- Technical assistance to local project teams relating to embodied carbon of materials
- Reallocation of funds if any jurisdiction is unable to fully utilize funds within implementation period (as determined in coordination with local jurisdictions)

Roles and responsibilities of local governments

- Project compliance and reporting oversight in alignment with federal and state requirements
- Administration of competitive grant process, in collaboration with DEQ as needed
- Regular communication and reporting with DEQ regarding status of implementation

Tillamook County Commissioners,

I realize this is being submitted late. But because the matter in the long run may be urgent I would like to submit my concerns about Agenda #10 "Consideration of a Letter of Commitment to Participate in an Oregon DEQ Application for Climate Pollution Reduction Grant Program" on the agenda for tomorrow at the Tillamook Board of Commissioner's meeting.

It is actions like this that lead us to the disaster of last Thursday's HCP vote, that has the potential to deplete our local government spending revenues—making major functions of local government unfunded. It always starts with a carrot that seems to be to the benefit of our county, but which ends up leaving us atarving.

Let me explain, it is clear from the Biden Administration's full commitment to U.N. Agenda 2030 (<https://www.un.org/sustainabledevelopment/development-agenda/>) that organizations such as the EPA have no intention of balancing what is good and profitable for human kind with what they cannot prove will be good for the "environment" in future. For instance, in this letter of consideration it is alleged that "8% of Oregon's consumption based greenhouse gas emissions is

building material". But that is 8% of the .04% of carbon in a our atmosphere. The difference between 8% and the proposed change to <1% of .04% of our atmosphere is .0032%. How will that make a difference in our air quality? Will it matter if our forests are mismanaged and we have a another Tillamook Burn? Meanwhile what will be the cost of freedom down the road? Will our community development department decide that NO new houses can be over 1200 sq. ft.? 800 sq. ft.? What is the limiting principle of arbitrary power to that unelected county office?

My point is every time the Tillamook County Board of Commissioners align themselves with philosophies and policies to receive federal or state tax dollars, it does so at the risk of the county coffers and human flourishing. Personally, I would choose more freedom in the future than cheap "more efficient" small houses. Perhaps, there would be more housing available if the Community Development department had not raised their fees exponentially in the past few years? Perhaps the myriad of regulations on everything have increased building costs of homes?

I think there are better answers than submitting to the EPA, the Biden Administration, and the U.N. for Tillamook County housing issues. And none of those entities have to live with the consequences of our lost ability to sustain county functions or personal economic freedom by passing arbitrary rules, policies, and goals.

So at what cost are you selling our future?
